The head table was introduced by Lt. Gov. Young; followed by members who introduced themselves, and their guest(s), as well as providing home location and Mayflower ancestor(s).

Minutes from the May 2004 meeting were approved as printed in the November 2004 issue of the Mayflower Chronicles.

Treasurer's Report was accepted as presented by Betty-Jean Haner. A motion was made by Mr. Saunders, Sr. to donate \$25 from the Albany Colony to the Mayflower Library Fund in memory of our members who are recently deceased (2004). Bob Haff, seconded, and the motion was carried.

Our Albany Colony Roster has been completed and mailed out by Rick Saunders. A round of applause for a great job done by Rick.

Historian's report was given by Bob Haff, as presented in the Chronicles.

Chronicles Editor, Phil Bradway, would like to add more articles from members. This can be done through email.

Archivist – Susan Szewczyk brought the Colony scrapbook for viewing. Please submit newspaper articles pertaining to this group for the scrapbook to her.

Members/guests present – 56 Junior members present – 1 Junior Program – The 23 Junior members in New York State are primarily located in the NYC area: 18 members are ages 14-23; 5 members are age 10 and under. Note: one third of the children coming to America on the Mayflower died during the first year.

Old Business: No one responded to the appeal for someone to take over the coordination of the Plimouth Plantation play actors visiting Albany area schools and presenting to 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Grades. The Youngs are still looking for someone else to do this in the future.

New Business: There will be a trip to London to visit the "Mayflower Tavern." Supposedly this tavern was built from the disassembled wood of the Mayflower ship.

Insignia – Mayflower insignia is meant to be worn at a Mayflower meeting or when representing the Society at a function; please do not wear insignia just as jewelry to church or elsewhere.

Dr. Jeffery Perez spoke about "Putting Albany on the Map" - a program on the Capital District Region being the Crossroads of American History. Dr. Perez is especially interested in studying maps. His slides demonstrate how maps in earlier years were used a great deal to provide information; not only to find a specific location, but illumination of an area or provide details of a story. In the 1700's, NYS maps showed towns such as Saratoga and Albany already named. These particular towns were most important during the American Revolution. During the 1800's the Erie Canal was built – a network of canals to access trade from West to East ending at Albany. In the 1900's the New York Central Railroad ran from the Midwest through Central New York along the shores of the Erie Canal through Albany to NYC. The first passenger train ran from Schenectady to Albany, along the Erie Canal to where the Mohawk River meets the Hudson River. Locomotives were built in Schenectady. Rensselaer Polytechnical Institute (Troy) was established by engineers working on the Erie Canal needing additional trained professional engineers to assist with the projects. All this led up to industry and research being located in this area, continuing today and well on its way into the future. This was a most interesting presentation around our Albany area local history.

Our next meeting will be held May 7, 2005 at the Normanside Country Club, Delmar, NY.

The Closing Prayer was given by Betty-Jean Haner and the meeting adjourned at 3:08 PM.

#### A True tale from a Dead Relative Collector

I would like to tell you a "true tale" that happened to my father when he was helping me collect the necessary documentation for me to join the Mayflower Society.

My paternal grandmother Winona Smith Cobb was my family's family historian. It was through her collection of family records of dates and places that I was able to join the Mayflower Society.

I needed a copy of my father's great grandmother Maryann "Bartlett" Stout's death record to put with my application. So, I called my dad who lived in Raymond, Maine where Maryann had died, and asked him to go to the local town clerk's office to request a copy of Maryann's death record. My father agreed to collect the record for me after I had given him the date she died which was June 23, 1965.

The following day he went down to the town clerk's office in Raymond to request the record. He called me back later that night. I asked if he had received the record. He said, "Ah, no." I asked "was there a problem?" He said, "Yeah, you could say that." I then asked "what was the problem? Did they have a fire or something?" He said, "No, that wasn't the problem." So, I asked again "what happened?" The following is a true story!

My father said when he asked for the death record and told the lady the date, her response was the following. "Ah, yeah we have records for that time period, but there is a problem." My dad asked, "What is the problem?" "She said, "Those record books are down in the vault downstairs." Dad said, "So?" Well she said, "We can't go down there." "Why not dad asked?" And this is a direct quote. She looked my father straight in the eye and said, "None of the girls like to go into the vault, because strange things have happened." My dad said, "Strange things? What do you mean?" She said "It's haunted!"

"My father pulled his glasses down his nose looked her straight in the eye and said. "You're kidding, right? Look, if you don't have the time to do the record I can come back later, just don't give me some bologna about the vault being haunted of all things!" She said, "Sir, I am not kidding strange things have happened down there and none of us goes down there, I am sorry but we can't give you the record." My dad just shook his head in amazement and left. I said, "You're kidding?" he said, "Nope she was deadly serious."

I said, I will call cousin Faith, she also lived in Raymond. She was serving on the town council. I knew SHE will get to the bottom of this bologna about a "haunted vault." So I called Faith, I told her what happened and she was very upset. Maryann was her aunt. She said, "I will call you right back." A few hours later, she called me back. She said,

"Tell your dad to go down to the town clerks office, the

record is waiting for him." I said, "Thanks! I knew YOU would handle it." So, I called my dad back. The next day dad went down to the clerk's office again. Walked in and said, "Hi, I remember me?" She said, "Oh yes, you were here yesterday, we have your record for you Mr. Cobb, here you are, no charge." My dad said, "I couldn't resist, I had to ask." "So, did you run into any ghosts while you were down there?" looking him straight in the eye she replied, "Nope, and you know what? We actually found some records we didn't know we had!"




