Remembers Bette Bradway 1937-2018

Bette (Innes) (Stelman) Bradway joined the New York State Mayflower Society in January 1976 and was elected the Albany Colony Historian (then called "Registrar") one month later. She was Lieutnant Governor of the Albany Colony for seven years from 1988-1994 (two three-year terms plus completion of the previous Lieutenant Governor's term for one year), and she held one office or another with the Albany Colony until 2001.

Bette became the New York State Mayflower Society Historian in 1988. She served in that capacity for fourteen years and assisted more than 800 applicants with completing their papers. Bette was qualified as a "Certified Genealogist" by the Board for Certification of Genealogists in 1988, and was re-certified (as required) every five years after that. In September 2002, she was elected as the Historian General of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants and served in that position through September 2005. The position as General Historian at that time was as a volunteer with a free bedroom in Plymouth. From 2005 until 2018, she was Co-Historian of the New York State Mayflower Society.

Bette had several articles published in the Mayflower Quarterly, and had an article on the Southhold, Long Island Rackett Family (one of her husband Phil's families) published in the New York Genealogical & Biographical Record. Along with her Mayflower Society memberships, Bette belonged to the Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge, the Jamestowne Society, the National Society of Women, the Genealogical & Biographical Record, and the New England Historic Genealogical Society.

Bette was the daughter of Robert and Lucille (VanBrocklin) Innes and graduated from Nott Terrace High School in Schenectady, New York, class of 1955. Bette has two sons, one of whom is a member, and her granddaughter, who is a Junior member. They are descended from William Brewster and Stephen Hopkins. After the untimely death of her first husband, Henry J. Stelman, in 1966, she met and married Philip H. Bradway, who was also a very active New York Society and Albany Colony member, also with a Brewster line. Phil died in 2012.

Bette was a retired Registered Nurse, having graduated from nursing school in Buffalo in 1958, and she spent most of her nursing career in Orthopedic Nursing. When she had time, her hobbies included amateur ("ham") radio, sewing, gardening, playing the organ and cooking.

Program: "A Brief History of the New York State Library and the Genealogy Material that is Currently Housed on the 7th and 11th floors" was presented by Arthur Young, NYSL Genealogy Assistant. The New York State Library was established in 1818 by Governor DeWitt Clinton to serve the Government of the State and is one of the largest libraries in the world by numbers of items held with over 20 million print items and more than 50,000 digital items. Genealogy information and materials are housed on the 7th and 11th floors and are readily available to the public for research purposes.

Benediction was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr. Meeting adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

"In April, Bradford had decided that each household should be assigned to its own plot to cultivate, with the understanding that each family kept whatever it grew. "The good news is that advanced research techniques, improved genealogy library collections and computerized resources have made it easier to track down your Pilgrim roots. If you are interested in joining us, you will need to provide evidence of your lineage from one of the Mayflower Pilgrims. Anyone who can prove this ancestry may join.

"Fill out our Mayflower Lineage Match form - We will compare your proposed lineage with the approved papers in our files to determine what portion of your line is already documented - and give you instructions on how to proceed.

"For becoming an approved official member at GSMD, your first step is to contact one of our 53 Member Societies and work with the historian of that Society on your application. All members apply through a Member Society. Each Member Society has its own structure with its own governor and officers, including at least one historian who can help you figure out lines and gather documents."

At the close of the luncheon and business meeting on May 5th, Elder Art Young presented a talk on the genealogical resources available at the New York State Library in Albany. He also provided us with a comprehensive and informative written description of the voluminous collections of materials stored there, explaining how to navigate the different areas of the building and how to locate specific types of information.

The State Library, created in 1818 at the urging of Governor DeWitt Clinton, is the third oldest in the nation. As Art explained, it is one of the largest libraries in the world by number of items held with over 20 million items, along with collections of historic documents and artifacts.

In observance of its 200th birthday year, the Library is celebrating with various offerings of public interest through November. It is a real treasure trove and a magnificent resource for serious genealogical and historical researchers (like those of us here!) who are fortunate enough to live in upstate New York.



The First Thanksøivinø

Who among us would not cry "foul" (or should I say "fowl") at Thanksgiving to encounter anything other than a glorious, plump, golden roast turkey with all the customary delicious accompaniments of the modern annual celebratory feast?

Yet we would be hard pressed to recognize the menu at the "First Thanksgiving." That would have taken place sometime in September or October of 1621, and while the first bountiful harvest celebrated by our Mayflower ancestors supplied corn, squash, beans, peas, and barley for their feasting (and for the cold, lean months ahead), nothing remotely resembling the meaty Butterball turkeys we all know and love would have been presented. Nor did they have potatoes, or bread stuffing, though they may have used herbs, nuts, cranberries, and wild onions, and they did have plums, melons, grapes and other vegetables and fruits.

Culinarians at today's Plimoth Plantation suggest that duck or goose was the mainstay, although then-plentiful passenger pigeons, pheasants, swans, and yes, scrawny wild turkeys could have supplemented the offerings. The small birds were probably both boiled and roasted, giving them rich flavor, and eels, fish, and shellfish were also available. Massasoit and ninety Wampanoag braves who joined the Pilgrims for that communal celebration brought with them five deer to be roasted for the feast. Kathleen Wall, Colonial Foodways Culinarian for Plimoth Plantation, has said that venison would have been an extraordinary gift, as at that time it was a tradition "reserved for nobility and gentlemen." In order to determine the foods that could have appeared at that "First Thanksgiving," heavy reliance has been placed on "period cookbooks and journals, Wampanoag oral histories, paintings from the time, and archaeological evidence."

It was no "one and done" meal, of course; that original harvest festival literally continued for three straight days, along with games and contests of skill, with feasting and socializing which would have been unaccustomed merriment for those hardworking Puritan folk, but which surely encouraged nascent friendships among the natives and the newcomers. Presumably the men did the "heavy lifting" but the cooking and serving were "women's work", and while eighteen adult women had stepped ashore in the New World in November 1620, by the fall of 1621 just four of them survived to prepare all those meals. There were a few teenage girls who must have pitched in to lend a hand, and together with their men and children, there was a large contingent indeed of hungry souls gathered together in gratitude to their God that autumn so very long ago.

Pilgrim Edward Winslow, who has been honored as "the first European to negotiate a peace treaty with Indians," wrote this description in a letter:

"Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together after we had gathered the fruit of our labors. They four in one day killed as much fowl as, with a little help beside, served the company almost a week. At which time, among other recreations, we exercised our arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and among the rest their greatest king Massasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted, and they went out and killed five deer, which they brought to the plantation and bestowed upon our governor, and upon the captain, and others. And although it be not always so plentiful as it was at this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want that we often wish you partakers of our plenty."

Robert W. Laird, who was at one time a "deputy editorial page editor" of the New York *Daily News*, closed an excellent November article he had published several years ago (which I had saved) with this thought:

"The significance of Thanksgiving depends on who you are and what you want to emphasize. For some, it's a patriotic parable. Others stress the religious aspect. Still others see it as a political tale; the Pilgrims risked everything to flee European intolerance and oppression, and Thanksgiving symbolizes the rightness of that choice. And many see it as a lesson about cooperation among people of diverse cultures—thus the importance of the Indians at the feast."
