Colony Governor's Message

As we approach 2020, the 400th Anniversary of the *Mayflower* voyage, did you know that the plans were formalized in 1619? And that these early plans were one of the causes and reasons for the **Mayflower Compact**? In Nathaniel Philbrick's *Mayflower*, "By June 1619, [Gov. John] Carver and [Robert] Cushman had succeeded in securing a patent from the Virginia Company," p. 19, for the future *Mayflower* voyage of 1620. By 1614, John Smith (previously from Jamestown) had sailed the New England coastline for King James and drawn a map of it naming the area New England. New England was actually no longer referred to as Northern Virginia.


William Bradford, in *Of Plymouth Plantation*, referred to the **Mayflower Compact** as *the Deed of Government* drawn up on Cape Cod, 11th of November, A.D. 1620. This Deed of Government was created partly due to the mutinous speeches of some of the Strangers who boarded the *Mayflower* in London. When they got ashore, they planned to use their liberty with no one having the power to command them. Their rationale was that the patent procured in June 1619 was for Virginia, not New England, which belonged to another company, with which the Virginia company had nothing to do. The **Mayflower Compact** became essential to maintain law and order. And now you know another reason it was written and signed by our male ancestors. As we journey toward 2020, please know that our forefathers had already formalized the 1620 venture by June of 1619. Our *Mayflower* ancestors knew this, whether Saints or Strangers.

Our November 9th luncheon/meeting presentation will be: "Great Graves of Upstate New York" by Chuck D'Imperio of Unadilla. One of Upstate's most "in demand" public speakers, his audiences enjoy his stories of the region and its people, events, and folk tales. His talks are lively, thoughtful, and always a lot of fun. Chuck is an award-winning radio broadcaster (more than 25 years on the air), a newspaper columnist, and the author of several popular books that celebrate upstate New York. This promises to be a fascinating and entertaining presentation.

May 4, 2019 - Meeting Minutes

The **Spring Meeting** of the Albany Colony, SOMD, was held at the Normanside Country Club, 150 Salisbury Road, Delmar, NY on Saturday, May 5th. In the absence of Colony Gov. David W. Morton, the meeting was called to order by 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Douglass Mabee at 12:30 p.m. The Invocation was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America led by 2nd Deputy Colony Governor Douglass (Tim) Mabee.

Officers present were introduced by 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Douglass (Tim) Mabee; Secretary Sandra A. Zerrillo; Treasurer Betty-Jean Haner; Co-Captains Priscilla Davis and Tim Mabee; Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., Archivist Kristen Moore.

New members -- There were no new members in attendance at this meeting. Self-introductions by members and guests included name, location, and ancestors. Members present 28 & guests 18 = 46. Minutes from the November 4, 2018 meeting were printed in the Chronicles. The minutes were filed as printed. Treasurer's Report: Presented by Betty Jean-Haner. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Historian – The Historian's Report was published in the last issue of the Chronicles. The report was filed as printed. Chronicles: 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Mabee thanked Editor Sylvia Magin for her outstanding dedication to publishing the issues of the Chronicles. Website: 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Mabee thanked past Webmaster Karl Danniel for all the work that he has done over the years as our past Webmaster. The current Webmaster, Jim Pratt, gave a short presentation to highlight the new website that has been created for the Albany Colony.

Longevity Certificates – This year the Albany Colony awarded longevity certificates to nine members who were celebrating milestone anniversaries. The recipients and the years of membership were printed in the May Chronicles. Secretary Sandra Zerrillo presented a 25-year certificate to Sherret Chase. Unbeknownst to our Albany Officers, Sherret turned 100 years old last June. It was decided that at this May meeting, we would honor Sherret and celebrate his upcoming 101st birthday. Secretary Zerrillo read a short biography of Sherret's life and presented him with a special birthday certificate and birthday cake for him to take home and enjoy with his family. The presentation ended with all those in attendance singing "Happy Birthday."

Old Business: 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Mabee expressed his thanks to the Website Committee and especially Jim Pratt for their hard work on this project. (1) A motion was made by Eleanor Morris and seconded by Kristen Moore to adopt Jim Pratt's website at the annual expense of \$100.00 for the Albany Colony. Motion carried. (2) A motion was made by B-J Haner and seconded by Jim Rogers to approve a donation to the GSMD 2020 Fund in the amount of \$400.00 in Memory of Bette Bradway. Motion carried.

New Business: (1) A motion was made by Arthur Young and seconded by Jim Rogers to approve a donation in the amount of \$100.00 to the New York State Society of the Mayflower Descendants in Memory of Robert Morse. Motion carried. (2) Election of Assistant Treasurer 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Mabee announced that Walley Francis had been nominated for Assistant Treasurer by the Executive Committee. 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Mabee asked if there were any nominations from the floor. Hearing none a voice vote was taken. Walley Francis was unanimously elected to the position. (3) The 2019-2020 Proposed Annual Budget was introduced by 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Mabee. A motion was made by Kristen Moore and seconded by B-J Haner to adopt the Proposed Annual Budget of \$1,960 for the Albany Colony. Motion carried.

Mabee will seek the approval of the Insignia Chairman prior to ordering the pins. **(5)** Albany Colony Website Addendums **(a)** A motion was made by Kristen Moore and seconded by Priscilla Davis to adopt a new Domain for an Annual cost of \$30.00 for the Albany Colony website. **Motion carried**. **(b)** A motion was made by Eleanor Morris and seconded by Kristen Moore to adding a Facebook Page at no cost to the new Albany Colony Website. **Motion carried**. It should be noted that the Facebook Page is currently set to "Secret" and only members given permission by the webmaster can join this page and view the contents of the site.

Program - Co-Captain Priscilla Davis introduced guest speaker Jack Casey, local attorney, author, storyteller, and songwriter. Mr. Casey gave a wonderful video presentation that provided a backdrop of his novel "A Land Beyond the River," which is described by Mr. Casey "as a love story centered around the digging of the Erie Canal during the War of 1812," while our Webmaster Jim Pratt handled the slide projector. Mr. Casey ended his program by singing and playing his guitar for us, which everyone enjoyed. After the program Mr. Casey graciously signed several copies of his book and gave them away to the members.

Benediction was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr. Meeting adjourned at 3:00 p.m.








"The Mayflower is now in the water!"

When the Captain of the Mayflower II made that pronouncement from the ship's quarterdeck on September 7, 2019, the huge crowd assembled at Mystic Seaport to witness the ship's relaunch burst into cheers. After three years of extensive repair work, the beautiful ship, a replica of the original and a gift from England to America for its help during World War II, was again afloat. The restoration work at Mystic Seaport Museum's Henry B. duPont Preservation Shipyard was a much bigger task than originally anticipated, since it was not known how bad the damage would be after some sixty-two years in salt water. Work continues until spring on this \$7,370,000 restoration and will include mast, sails, and rigging.



Nathaniel Philbrick, noted author and Mayflower historian, was the keynote speaker at the September 7 festivities at what is considered the nation's leading maritime museum. Opening remarks were delivered by Steve White, President of Mystic Seaport Museum, and the National Anthem was performed by the United States Coast Guard Band. The recent event in Connecticut, which featured numerous dignitaries, also included a christening of the Mayflower II performed by Harriet Cross, British Consul General to New England, with water from all 50 states and England.

Steve Brodeur, Board Chairman of Plimoth Plantation, made mention of the storm missing the celebration site during his remarks. "What an amazing day. What an amazing moment. A day we've waited for, for so, so long," he said. "And isn't it fitting on this day that a hurricane (Dorian) just passed by? Because I know there's a ship right here who's itching to take on some big waves."

"Mayflower II is truly a national treasure," said Jared Bowen, WGBH Boston's executive arts editor and master of ceremonies for the celebration. "Because of this restoration, she'll be able to sail far into the future and carry on her educational mission for generations to come." But it will be awhile before that happens; the Mayflower II will spend the coming winter at Mystic Seaport. On May 14, 2020, the Mayflower II is slated to arrive in Boston, where it will be escorted into Boston Harbor by the USS Constitution to kick off "Mayflower Sails 2020," a free six-day maritime festival at the Charlestown Navy Yard commemorating the 400th anniversary of Mayflower's Atlantic crossing. The ship will return to Plymouth, Mass., the following week and then sail in September to Provincetown to commemorate the signing of the Mayflower Compact.

News from the GSMD Website: Representatives of four nations gathered in September at the headquarters of American Ancestors (the New England Historic Genealogical Society) in Boston to announce plans for the 400th commemoration of the *Mayflower* voyage. GSMD joined with organizations from the Wampanoag Nation, the United Kingdom, and the Netherlands to share events that will be taking place on both sides of the Atlantic in 2020. These commemorative events will tell the story of the *Mayflower* Pilgrims and their journey from Leiden, Holland and Plymouth, England to modern-day Provincetown and, finally, Plymouth Colony in 1620. GSMD has many exciting plans for 2020, starting with participation in an event that will be witnessed by an estimated 50 million people worldwide— the Rose Bowl Parade on January 1, 2020.
