## Colony Governor's Message Nov. 4, 2023

Did you know that more men signed the Mayflower Compact with 41 signers than the U.S. Constitution with 39 signers? The Mayflower Compact (1620) brought the English concepts of Law and Liberty to the New World. The Compact created a common bond among the 102 pilgrims at Plymouth.

The Mayflower Compact continued the idea of law made by the people. This idea lies at the heart of democracy. From its crude beginning in Plymouth, self-government evolved into the town meetings of New England and larger local governments in Colonial America.

The ideas of self-government from the Mayflower Compact helped the first colonists. It became a fundamental idea for our Constitution. Additionally, their desire to worship as they wished is embodied in the First Amendment of the Bill of Rights.


Our November 4th luncheon/meeting presentation will be: "George Washington & Saratoga: It's Complicated" By John Oliver, a published author and local writer. ## Minutes of the May 2023 Meeting Albany Colony, Society of Mayflower Descendants

The Meeting of the Albany Colony, SOMD, was held at Chieftans Restaurant, 584 East Main Street, Cobleskill, NY on Saturday, May 6th. The meeting was called to order by Colony Gov. David W. Morton at 12:15 p.m. with a quorum present. The Invocation was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America led by 1st Colony Deputy Gov. & Co-Captain Douglass (Tim) Mabee.

Officers present were introduced by Colony Gov. Morton: 1<sup>st</sup> Deputy Colony Gov. and Co-captain Douglass (Tim) Mabee; 2<sup>nd</sup> Deputy Colony Governor David Young; Secretary Sandra A. Zerrillo; Assistant Treasurer Carol Felsen; Co-Captain Priscilla Davis; Historian Paul S. Johnson; and Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr.

New members present were introduced: Sara Harmon (Samuel Fuller); Marla Hoskins (George Soule); and Patrick McKenna (William Brewster). Self-introductions by members and guests included name, location, and ancestors. Members present - 44 & guests - 23 = 67. Secretary's Report: Minutes from the meeting held November 5, 2022, were printed in the *Chronicles*. The minutes were accepted and filed as printed in the *Chronicles*. Treasurer Report: Presented by Assistant Treasurer Carol Felsen. A motion was made by Jim Rogers, seconded by Art Young to accept the report as read. The motion was approved. The report was filed. Audit Committee Report: The audit committee (consisting of Tim Mabee and Kristen Moore) reported that an official audit had been conducted prior to the May meeting. The committee found all accountings to be in order. A motion was made by Art Young, seconded by Jim Rogers to accept the Audit Report. Motion approved.

Prior to the Roll Call, Secretary Zerrillo discussed the Roll Call of Approved Pilgrims. A question had been raised at previous meetings as to why Dorothy May Bradford is the only wife listed on the document for William Bradford, when no Bradford Descendants are actually the children of Dorothy? Dorothy perished after the Mayflower docked in Plymouth Harbor. William subsequently remarried, and his line carried forth from his second wife, Alice.

The reason that Dorothy's name appears is because she was an original passenger on the Mayflower. Alice Bradford did not come over on the Mayflower and is therefore ineligible to be listed.

This omission doesn't in any way slight Alice or her descendants, it merely upholds the authenticity of the document and accurately states only the names of those who were on board. Bottom line: all Bradford Descendants are descended through William, whose name is most definitely listed on the document.

**New Business:** Proposed change to the Constitution and ByLaws of the Albany Colony Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of New York:

#### **ARTICLE VII: Executive Committee**

<u>Proposed wording</u>: "SECTION 5: Quorum A quorum at Executive Committee meetings shall be a majority of officers." <u>Rationale</u>: Our Existing ByLaw: Section 5 reads: A quorum at Executive Committee meetings shall be six (6) officers.

A quorum of six worked when eleven officers were filling eleven offices, as we had in 2010. It doesn't work now (2023), as a quorum of six is often difficult to achieve with only nine officers holding eleven offices.

Robert's Rules of Order (12th Edition): The quorum is a majority of the members of the board unless a different quorum is provided for by the bylaws, Chapter XI, 40.5.

"August, 1593, the year a strong Act was passed, against Puritans and Separatists, threatening the Punishment of Persons Obstinately Refusing to Come to Church: 'All persons above the age of sixteen refusing to come . . .or persuading others to deny Her Majesty's authority in causes ecclesiastical, or dissuading them from coming . . .or being found present at any conventicle or meeting under pretence of religion, shall upon conviction be committed to prison without bail till they shall conform and come to church.'

#### The Covenant

"On November 11, 1620, the Mayflower rounded Race Point and set anchor in the safe waters of 'the Bay of Cape Cod,' or what today is known as Provincetown Harbor. After sixty-three grueling days at sea, their journey was almost over. On the same day that they set anchor in the harbor, even before heading ashore, the men sat down to write the Mayflower Compact.

"The text expressed their oath to 'covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation . . .'

"Although quite brief and economically written, this simple document is the foundation of all the democratic institutions in America; its salt-stained papyrus is the sturdy plinth on which the Republic was built."

"The Mayflower Compact, which sowed a seed of Democracy on American soil, would never have been written if the Pilgrims had reached their original destination on this continent.

"The patent they held from the Virginia Company of London had no validity in New England, so the voyagers found themselves outside the jurisdiction of existing laws when they were turned back by the treacherous waters of Pollock Rip shoals and decided to make their landing on the Massachusetts coast. Let William Bradford tell this story:

- "'I shall a little turn back, and begin with a combination made by them before they came ashore, being the first foundation of their government in this place.'
- "'Occasioned partly by the discontented and mutinous speeches that some of the strangers amongst them had let fall from them in the ship: That when they came ashore they would use their own liberty, for none had power to command them, the patent they had being for Virginia and not for New England, which belonged to another government, with which the Virginia Company had nothing to do. And partly that such an act by them done, this their condition considered, might be as firm as any patent, and in some respects more sure.'

**Please note:** generations are only documented to the 5th generation in the <u>Mayflower Silver Books</u> (a few may include additional generations). Documentation beyond the first five generations may be required and proof from other lineage societies may or may not be considered acceptable by The Mayflower Society. 

Our Colony Elder Art Young offered a closing benediction at the finish of the day's delightful and meaningful activities, sending us all homeward bound with a blessing.


## House Fires in Early Plymouth

"In Plymouth's early history, in the first winter the roof of the common house burned off twice. The first instance occurred '. . . the 14th of January, in the morning about 6 of the clock . . . The most loss was Master Carver's and William Bradford's, who then lay sick in bed, and if they had not risen with good speed, had been blown up with powder, but, through God's mercy, they had no harm . . . Then again on 'Friday, the 9th [of Feb], still the cold weather continued, that we could do little work. That afternoon our little house for our sick people was set on fire by a spark that kindled in the roof, but no great harm was done.'



"Fire was an ever present concern with wooden houses and thatched roofs. In particular Plymouth's militia would be called upon to help in instances of fire. However in 1622 'Fearing, also, lest the enemy at any time should take any advantage by firing our houses, Captain Standish appointed a certain company, that whensoever they saw or heard fire . . . should only betake themselves to their arms and enclose the house or place endangered, and stand aloof on their guard . . . with their backs towards the fire, to prevent treachery . . . If the fire were in any of the houses of this guard, they were then freed from it; but not otherwise, without special command.' (Good News). Reading the description of the 1623 fire in Of Plimoth Plantation, we can see that this plan was carried out by the militia."

"The received myth of the Pilgrims confuses these folk with the Massachusetts Bay Puritans who came to America about ten years later and settled about fifty miles to the north of Plymouth Plantation. So we tend to picture our band of Pilgrims dressed all in black, with high pointy hats. In reality. . .except on Sundays when black dress was compulsory, mostly wore garments of russet or dark green, though the women sometimes wore quite handsome dresses of saffron or dark."

<u>From Binghamton & West</u>—East Take I-88 to Exit 24 (Duanesburg). Follow Route 20 East 6.8 miles. Turn Right onto Rte. 158 for 1.8 miles, then Left onto Rte. 146 for 2.2 miles. Turn Right onto Ostrander Road, then bear Left onto Wormer Road go Club entrance on the right.

<u>CONTINUE</u> to end of Expressway at Route 20/Western Avenue, then continue 2.5 miles left onto Route 155. Continue 2.5 miles to Wormer Road., then turn right. Turn right at top of hill. Continue on Wormer Road to Club entrance 3/4 mile on the right.
