Colony Governor's Message for November 2, 2024

The Mayflower Compact was signed on the *Mayflower* on November 21 [November 11, Old Style], 1620, in Provincetown Harbor, Massachusetts. It was the first framework of government written and enacted in the territory that is now the United States of America.

The Mayflower Compact, originally titled "*Agreement Between the Settlers of New Plymouth*," was the first governing document of Plymouth Colony. It was written by the men aboard the *Mayflower*, consisting of Separatist Puritans, adventurers, and tradesmen.

The 1620 agreement was also known as "*The Plymouth Combination*" and usually referred to by Plymouth inhabitants as "*The Combination*." It was first called the "*Mayflower Compact*" in 1793 when it was reprinted for the first time outside of Massachusetts by a historian in the state of New York.

The Mayflower Compact created laws for Mayflower Pilgrims and non-Pilgrims alike for the good of their new colony. It was a short document which established that: The colonists would remain loyal subjects to King James, despite their need for self-governance.

Our Luncheon Meeting program will be presented by Sara (Mrs. Michael) Center of Clifton Park, who is a Research and Collections Technician at the New York State Bureau of Historic Sites and Park Services. Sara, a graduate of the University of North Carolina, Wilmington, has a Master's Degree in Art History and Design and an Advanced Certificate in Museum Studies, and was formerly employed at the famous Frick Museum in New York City. She will share with us "*Protecting New York Legacy at Peebles Island State Park*."

Minutes of the May 4, 2024 Meeting
Albany Colony, Society of Mayflower Descendants

The Meeting of the Albany Colony, SOMD, was held at Chieftans Restaurant, 584 East Main Street, Cobleskill, New York on Saturday, May 4th. The meeting was called to order by Colony Gov. David W. Morton at 12:24 p.m. The Invocation was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance of the Flag of the United States of America led by 1st Colony Deputy Gov. & Co-Captain Douglass (Tim) Mabee.

Officers present were introduced by Colony Gov. Morton: [1st Deputy Colony Gov.](#) & Co-Captain Douglass (Tim) Mabee; 2nd Deputy Colony Governor David Young; Secretary Sandra A. Zerrillo; Treasurer Lisa O'Brien; Assistant Treasurer Carol Felsen; Co-Captain Priscilla Davis; Historian & Archivist Paul S. Johnson; and Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr. Gov. Morton also introduced Special Guest New York City Colony Historian Susan Abanor.

New members present were introduced by Colony Gov. Morton: Louise Ilene Sparrow (Francis Cooke). **Self-introductions** by members and guests included name, location, and ancestors. Members present - 33 & guests - 18 = 51. **Secretary's Report:** Minutes from the November 7, 2023, meeting were printed in the *Chronicles*. Colony Secretary Zerrillo thanked Priscilla Davis for preparing the November meeting minutes in her absence due knee replacement surgery. **Treasurer's Report:** Presented by Treasurer Lisa O'Brien. **The report was filed.**

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Audit Committee Report: 1st Deputy Colony Gov. & Audit Committee Chairman Tim Mabee reported that the audit committee had examined the records of the Treasurer of the Albany Colony, Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of New York. This was a review of the checking account, bank statements and supporting documentation from April 30, 2023 – April 30, 2024. The Committee found that the records were in good order and their contents appeared reasonable with the materials appearing to fairly represent the financial position, income, and expenses for the organization. The Audit Committee recommended that a Finance Committee be appointed to assist the Treasurer in making decisions regarding investing the Colony funds and moving bank accounts to other institutions to increase revenue and profit. A motion was made by Art Young, seconded by Priscilla Davis to accept the Audit Report. **The motion was approved.**

Albany Colony Governor Morton appointed the following Colony members to serve on the Finance Committee:

Historian: The Historian's Report written by Paul S. Johnson was printed in the May 2024 issue of the *Chronicles*. Website: Colony Gov. Morton thanked Webmaster Jim Pratt for his work in maintaining the Albany Colony website and face book page. These are members only sites, so please contact Jim if you wish to gain access. Jim reminded everyone that the *Chronicles* are available on both sites.

Minutes (continued-2)

Program: "Colonel Ichabod Alden and the Cherry Valley Massacre" presented by Peter Lindemann. Peter is a member of the Cobleskill Historical Society, Trustee in the Schoharie County Historical Society and with the Old Stone Fort Museum. John Alden is his 10th great-grandfather. Peter is also descended from Col. Ichabod Alden who commanded the 7th Massachusetts Regiment in Cherry Valley.

The Cherry Valley Massacre was an attack by British and Iroquois forces on the fort and the town of Cherry Valley in central New York on November 11, 1778. Col. Alden refused to believe the intelligence about the approaching hostile force. As a result, he did not bring the civilians into the fort for protection. When the attack came, Col. Alden was not in the fort. During the attack 32 civilians and 16 soldiers were killed and 71 residents were captured.

It has been described as one of the most horrific frontier massacres of the American Revolution. Col. Alden was killed by Joseph Brandt after the skirmish and is buried on the site where the soldiers fell during the attack which is now within the grounds of the Cherry Valley Cemetery. The violent frontier war of 1778 brought calls for the Continental Army to take action and helped pave the way for the launch of the 1779 Sullivan Expedition commissioned by Major General George Washington and led by Major General John Sullivan.

GSMD Member Societies

The General Society of Mayflower Descendants is made up of 54 Member Societies representing all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Canada, Europe, and Australia. Member Societies are volunteer organizations that were authorized and granted a Charter by the General Board of Assistants (GBOA).

Each Member Society has its own Constitution and Bylaws and elects its own officers (Governor, Assistant Governor, Treasurer, Secretary, Historian, Elder, Counsellor, Captain, Surgeon). Additionally, Member Societies set their own dues and fees. Those applying to become a member of The Mayflower Society must apply for membership through a Member Society.


In addition to their own elected officers, every Member Society has a Deputy Governor General (DGG) and an Assistant General (AG) who are nominated by their Society to be elected by the General Board of Assistants. They represent their Society at annual GBOA meetings and at the General *GSMD website*

"Lobsters and other shellfish provided the Pilgrims with an easily accessible food source in the summer months and was especially important in the early years when food was in short supply. William Bradford wrote that during the difficult years when food had to be rationed "all went to seeking of shellfish, which at low water they digged out of the sand."

"Though thankful, the Pilgrims did grow tired of this limited diet. Bradford wrote in 1623 that "the best dish they could present their friends with was a lobster or a piece of fish without bread or anything else but a cup of water. And the long continuance of this diet, and their labours abroad, had something abated the freshness of their former complexion."




Our program presenter for the day was **Peter Lindemann**, retired from a 33-year career in human resources with the New York State Assembly in Albany. He is a member of the Cobleskill Historical Society, a trustee in the Schoharie County Historical Society and the Old Stone Fort Museum, and a local Schoharie County historian. Peter long ago began following his passion by sharing the past through writing, giving lectures and standing in for famous historical personalities.



Peter, a tenth great-grandson of Mayflower Pilgrim John Alden, regaled us with tales and details of the “Cherry Valley Massacre,” an attack by British and Iroquois forces on a fort and the town of Cherry Valley on November 11, 1778, during the American Revolutionary War. Having taken place only about fifteen miles from where we were gathered, it has been described as one of the most horrific frontier massacres of the war, in which Captain Ichabod Alden was involved.

A mixed group of Loyalists, British soldiers, Senecas, and Mohawks descended on Cherry Valley, whose defenders, despite warnings, were unprepared for the attack. During the raid, the Seneca in particular targeted non-combatants, and reports state that thirty such individuals were killed, in addition to a number of armed defenders.

Peter supplemented his narrative with illustrations on large storyboards displayed on an easel, with Dave then raising them higher so everyone across the room could see them. We are grateful for Peter’s dedication to the preservation of local history, and as a result we can now all have a better understanding and appreciation of the events that transpired in central New York during the Revolution.

The Passage

The first few months of the Pilgrims' journey were truly a challenge; two months at sea, with 102 passengers and about 30 crew members – on a ship that clearly was not meant to hold so many people. Those who have visited Plymouth, and who not only have seen the replica of the *Mayflower*, but have been on board, will understand – and marvel at the living conditions of these courageous people.

Only one life was lost at sea, William Butten, a young servant to Dr. Samuel Fuller. One life was lost at Provincetown Harbor when William Bradford's wife, Dorothy, fell overboard. There was a birth at sea, a son to Stephen and Elizabeth Hopkins whom they named Oceanus. William and Susanna White's son Peregrine was born to them when the ship was anchored at Provincetown.

They arrived in November, when the weather was against them. At different times, three exploration parties went out on Cape Cod to determine the best place to settle; they would walk for miles, and as a result, the men became sick. They would spend days in the icy rain, cold temperatures and snow, with no shelters or dry clothes. As a result, their rate of death was high.

When scrolling through the short profiles of the passengers you will often see the words "died the first winter of 1620/21." Half of their numbers perished the first winter. Particularly heartbreaking are the families who perished – The Tinkers, Turners and Tilleys; those orphaned – Mary Chilton, Samuel Fuller, Priscilla Mullins and Elizabeth Tilley. [GSMD Website](#)
