They Needed a Carpenter, a Builder (Winter of 1620/21)

"As is the case with most of the Mayflower passengers, we know far too little about Francis Eaton....At Cape Cod on 11 November 1620 according to the old calendar, Francis was one of the 41 signers of the Mayflower Compact. There can be little doubt that the arrival of the Pilgrims at Plymouth early in the winter made it imperative that shelter be constructed as promptly as possible. Francis Eaton's competence as a carpenter could very well have been a factor in the prevention of even more deaths." (MF9:1)

How vital was the carpenter's trade for the foundation and survival of Plymouth! Along with tending to the sick and dying that first winter of 1620/21, someone had to address their need for building homes and shelters to protect them from the elements. They needed a carpenter. America's first hometown may well have relied on Francis Eaton to fulfill that role.

November 4, 2017 ~ MEETING MINUTES

The Fall Compact Day Meeting of the Albany Colony, SOMD, was held at the Albany Country Club, 300 Wormer Road, Voorheesville, NY on Saturday, November 4th. The meeting was called to order by Colony Gov. David W. Morton at 12:33 p.m. The Invocation was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance of the Flag of the United States of America led by 2nd Deputy Colony Governor Douglas (Tim) Mabee, followed by a special prayer led by Albany Colony Guest Colleen Harris for Past Historian Bette I. Bradway, who was unable to attend the meeting due to illness. The Mayflower Compact Day Proclamation, dated November 4th, signed by NYS Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, was read by Co-Captain Priscilla Davis.

Officers present were introduced by Col. Gov. Morton: 1ST Deputy Colony Gov. Walley G. Francis, 2nd Deputy Colony Gov. Douglass "Tim" Mabee, Secretary Sandra P. Zerrillo, Treasurer Betty-Jean Haner, Co-Captains Priscilla Davis and Tim Mabee, Historian Paul Johnson, Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., and Archivist Kristen Moore.

New members present were introduced: Ruth Ann Huggler (Richard Warren) and Alice Leonard (William White). **Self-introductions** by members and guests included name, location, and ancestors. Members present 31, guests 21 = 52. **Secretary's Report:** Minutes from the May 6, 2017 meeting were printed in the Chronicles. Motion to approve the minutes as printed was made and seconded. Motion carried. **Treasurer's Report:** Presented by Betty Jean-Haner. The report was filed. A motion was made by Betty-Jean Haner and seconded by Priscilla Davis to send flowers to Bette Bradway. Motion carried.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Historian: The Historian's Report written by Paul S. Johnson was printed in the November 2017 issue of the Chronicles. Colony Gov. Morton announced to the members present that at the May 6, 2017 meeting a procedural error had been made when he appointed Paul S. Johnson to fill the position of Historian. The Historian is an elected office rather than an appointed position. A motion was made by Priscilla Davis and seconded by Harriet Berard to nominate Paul S. Johnson to be elected as Historian. The Secretary was authorized to cast one ballot to elect the Historian. **Chronicles:** Colony Gov. Morton thanked Editor Sylvia Magin for her outstanding dedication to publishing the issues of the Chronicles. **Website:** In the absence of Webmaster Karl Danniel no report was given.

Minutes (continued)

Old Business: Co-Captain Priscilla Davis gave a report on the 2017 Mayflower Society 41st Triennial Congress that was held in Plymouth, MA this past September. Highlights of the 3-day conference included: (1) The announcement that the Society Board voted to accept the offer of the donation of the First Parish Meeting House to SOMD (which is a church that requires restoration and maintenance) and entered into a 3 million dollar Charitable Trust with detailed specifics. (2) Acceptance of a proposal from Family Search and New England Historic & Genealogical Society to digitize and index applications. These will be available only on the SOMD website, AmericanAncestor.com, and FamilySearch.org. Personal information such as those presently living and the past three generations will never be released to the public. (3) A discussion about the partnership formed between Family Tree DNA (FTDNA) and GSMD to identify lines from Mayflower Pilgrims using GSMD documentation and Family Tree testing. (4) A 2020 Monument is being commissioned and dedicated at this time.

New Business: Colony Gov. Morton expressed concern over the rising cost of having to pay speakers for the upcoming Albany Colony Meetings. It was suggested that the members of the society be asked if they have areas of expertise or know of friends or acquaintances that might be willing to be a speaker and give a presentation at future meetings.

Program: "Dutch Foodways," An Exploration of the Social, Cultural and Economic Role of Foods in Old and New Netherland presented by Shelby Mattice, Curator of the "Bronck Museum." Dressed in 17th Century period clothing, Ms. Mattice gave a most informative presentation on the toll that the invasion of the Dutch-English took on the Native Americans who inhabited the land.

Benediction was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr. Meeting adjourned at 2:50 p.m.






