

Free elections became one of the most important foundations in the New World. After signing the Mayflower Compact on November 11, 1620, the Pilgrim men chose their Governor, John Carver. "Carver's real title to fame is not so much that he was the Pilgrims' first governor, but rather that he was the first colonial governor in the New World, and perhaps the first in history, to be chosen by the colonists themselves in a free election."

Remember this foundation established by our forefathers and VOTE on November 8<sup>th</sup>.



# All About Free Elections as Described in Rev. John Robinson's Farewell Letter to John Carver

(Excerpted from Of Plymouth Plantation 1620-1647 by William Bradford, edited by Samuel Eliot Morison, 2006, and The Pilgrim Reader by George F. Willison, 1953)

Did you know that Rev. John Robinson in Leiden, Holland, described free elections occurring in the New World prior to the *Mayflower* voyage?

From the last letter that Mr. Carver lived to see from Rev. John Robinson; received prior to the *Speedwell's* voyage in August 5, 1620:

"Lastly, whereas you are become a body politic, using amongst yourselves civil government, and are not furnished with any persons of special eminency above the rest, to be chosen by you into office of government; let your wisdom and godliness appear, not only in choosing such persons as do entirely love and will promote the common good, but also in yielding unto them all due honour and obedience in their lawful administrations, not beholding in them the ordinariness of their persons, but God's ordinances for your good; not being like the foolish multitude who more honour the gay coat than the virtuous mind of man, or glorious ordinance of the Lord. But you know better things, and that the image of the Lord's power and authority which the magistrate beareth, is honourable in how mean persons soever. And this duty you both may the more willingly and ought the more consciously to perform, because you are at least for the present to have only them for your ordinary governors, which yourselves shall make choice of for that work." (Of Plymouth Plantation, p. 370.)

The Mayflower Compact was "ye first foundation of their governmente in this place, occasioned partly by ye discontented & mutinous speeches that some of the strangers amongst them had let fall, ...and partly that shuch an acte done (this their condition considered) might be as firme as any patent—and in some respects, more sure...."

"After the signing on November 11, 1620, they chose-or rather confirmed-Mr. John Carver as their Governor for that year. This was by popular election, presumably with all the freemen voting, Saints and Strangers alike. Annual elections of all major officers, from the governor down, continued at Plymouth till" they merged with Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1692.

"This eventful day (i.e., signing the Mayflower Compact) on the strife-torn Mayflower is memorable for another thing, John Carver's real title to fame is not so much that he was the Pilgrim's first governor, but rather that he was the first colonial governor in the New World, and perhaps the first in history, to be chosen by the colonists themselves in a free election." (The Pilgrim Reader, p. 101.)

Rev. John Robinson said to wisely choose in these free elections "such persons as do entirely love and will promote the common good." In Leiden, Holland, he foreshadowed modern American democratic elections. His message resonates with voters today.

300 Wormer Road, Voorheesville, NY 12186

## From Downtown Albany:

I-787 North to I-90 West to Exit 1—Route 20/Western Ave. Continue to end of Expressway. Right onto Route 20/Western Ave. Continue 2.5 miles. Left onto Route 155. Continue 2.5 miles to Wormer Road. Right onto Wormer Road. Turn Right at top of Hill, continuing on Wormer Road. Club entrance 3/4 miles on right.

## From Schenectady:

I-890 South to NYS Thruway/I-90. East on NYS Thruway/I-90 to Exit 24. Bear right going through toll. Follow signs, immediately after toll plaza, for Route 20/Western Ave. Continue to end of Expressway at Route 20/Western Ave. Right onto Route 20/Western Ave. Continue 2.5 miles to Wormer Road. Right onto Wormer Road. Turn Right at top of hill, continuing on Wormer Road. Club entrance 3/4 miles on right.

## From Troy:

I-787 South to I-90 West to Exit 1—Route 20/Western Ave. Continue to end of expressway at Route 20/Western Ave. Right onto Route 20/Western Ave. Continue 2.5 miles. Left onto Route 155. Continue 2.5 miles to Wormer Road. Right onto Wormer Road. Turn Right at Top of hill, continuing on Wormer Road. Club entrance 3/4 miles on right.

#### From Boston & East:

Mass Pike/I-90 West to NYS Thruway/I-87 North to Thruway Exit 24. Bear to right going through toll plaza. Follow signs, immediately after toll plaza, for Route 20/Western Ave. Continue to end of Expressway at Route 20/Western Ave. Right onto Route 20/Western Ave. Continue 2.5 miles. Left onto Route 155. Continue 2.5 miles to Wormer Road. Right onto Wormer Road. Turn Right at top of hill, continuing on Wormer Road. Club entrance 3/4 miles on right.

#### From Montreal & North:

Northway/I-87 South to end of Expressway at Route 20/Western Ave. Right onto Route 20/Western Ave. Continue 2.5 miles. Left onto Route 155. Continue 2.5 miles to Wormer Road. Right onto Wormer Road. Turn Right at top of hill, continuing on Wormer Road. Club Entrance 3/4 miles on right.

## From Syracuse & West:



300 Wormer Road, Voorheesville, NY 12186









## Mayflower Compact 1620

Agreement Between the Settlers of New Plymouth 1620

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN. We, whose names are underwritten, the Loyal Subjects of our dread Sovereign Lord King James, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. Having undertaken for the glory of God, and Advancement of the Christian Faith, and the Honour of our King and Country, a Voyage to plant the first Colony in the northern Parts of Virginia; Do by these Presents, solemnly and mutually, in the Presence of God and one another; covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil Body Politick, for our better Ordering and Preservation, and Furtherance of the Ends aforesaid; And by Virtue hereof do enact, constitute, and frame, such just and equal Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Constitution, and Officers, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general Good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due Submission and Obedience.

IN WITNESS whereof we have hereunto subscribed our names at Cape-Cod the eleventh of November, in the Reign of our Sovereign Lord King James, of England, France, and Ireland, the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fifty-fourth, Anno Domini; 1620.
