Colony Governor's Message

Each year at our November Luncheon Meeting, Albany Colony celebrates *Compact Day*. The *Mayflower Compact* was the first agreement for self-government in the New World, the first democratic government to be established in the Colonies.

The Mayflower passengers agreed to choose their leaders and make their own laws, which they agreed to follow. This had never been done before, here or in England. It established a "Civil Body Politic" (a temporary government) until one could be more permanently established. It allowed for the creation of "just and equal laws . . . for the general good of the Colony."

John Carver was elected as their Governor. All male passengers signed the Compact 397 years ago in Provincetown Harbor. As we enjoy our luncheon meeting on November 4th, let us reflect upon this covenant made by our Mayflower ancestors.

Our November 4th luncheon meeting presentation will be "Dutch Foodways," an exploration of the social, cultural, and economic role of foods in Old and New Netherland. Our presenter will be Shelby Mattice, Curator of the Bronck Museum, Greene County Historical Society. Shelby, who has a degree in anthropology from SUNY Albany, is an active researcher with special interest in the social history of the 17th to mid-19th centuries. She completed the cataloging of the entire object collection of the GCHS and is currently converting the Society's collection records to a computer-based system. She's a multi-talented individual with diverse interests and, considering our Mayflower forebears' sojourn in Holland, her program should be a fascinating one.

Thanks to Sylvia Magin for creating this issue of our *Mayflower Chronicles*, and to Karl Danniel for keeping the Albany Colony website up to date.



The Amazing Achievements of Sarah Josepha Hale—"The Godmother of Thanksgiving"

"Men have the power-women have the influence"

The "Godmother of Thanksgiving?" Sarah Josepha Hale didn't invent Thanksgiving, of course; in 1621 our Pilgrim ancestors, in overwhelming gratitude for deliverance and survival after that ghastly first year of loneliness, starvation, backbreaking toil, despair, and disease that had taken half of their number in an early death, celebrated a three-day festival of thanks along with their Wampanoag benefactor/friends.

She didn't create the holiday, either; President George Washington had inaugurated an annual day of thanksgiving. And she didn't institute it as a national holiday to be celebrated at the same time every year in every state; President Abraham Lincoln managed that—but she could claim that she <u>made him do it</u>. Who Sarah was, and how and why she accomplished it, make a wonderful story. Let me tell you about it.

Sarah was born in 1788 in New Hampshire, and today they are so proud of her up there that the New Hampshire Historical Society sells her likeness in their museum shop and on the Internet as a "Bobblehead Doll." Her father was Revolutionary War Captain Gordon Buell, so Sarah was what the DAR would call a "Real Daughter," although the Daughters of the American Revolution wasn't organized until after her death.

Sarah's mother, Martha Whittlesey, an intelligent woman who home-schooled her children, passed on to them her love of learning and of books. College for girls was not an option at that time, but Sarah's brother Horatio was going to Dartmouth, and realizing what a bright younger sister she was, and being the

kind of big brother he was, he spent his summer vacations sharing his college textbooks and his growing body of knowledge with her, in effect providing her with a fine education comparable to that of a college graduate.

When she was eighteen Sarah landed a position teaching boys and girls at a local private school, continuing until her marriage at the age of 25 to a a young lawyer named David Hale, truly a kindred spirit. He, too, tutored his wife, strongly encouraging her creative endeavors as they spent many evenings reading and studying together. Tragically, in 1822, after only nine years of marriage, Sarah lost her wonderful husband to pneumonia, leaving her with four young children and a newborn baby to support, but she was

neither helpless nor unprepared. Sarah was a fine writer, and she had already authored a number of poems while her husband was alive, so, with financial assistance from her late husband's local Masonic Lodge, she set about launching a literary career, publishing her first, and then a second book of poems.

Her first novel, "Northwood, A Tale of New England", was published in 1827 and was noticed by a clergyman named Rev. John Blake who was just then starting publication of The Ladies' Magazine. He persuaded her to move to Boston and become his Editor. She seized the opportunity, placed her older children with relatives, and in 1928, Sarah and her youngest son moved to Boston to begin what would become an astonishing career.

In 1836 a Philadelphian named Louis Antoine Godey bought *The Ladies' Magazine*, merging it with a new journal he was starting and hiring Sarah to continue to edit what became the *Godey's Ladies' Book*. She proceeded to turn a rather insignificant journal that published tiresome "watery romances" and reprinted articles from English periodicals into a smash hit, filling it with fashion plates in color and helpful articles on a wide range of topics of tremendous interest to women. Its circulation increased many times over and established Sarah as an important arbiter of influence and appeal over women.

Sarah remained a prodigious and prolific writer and editor for forty years, using this "bully pulpit" to advance her particular causes and continue her dedicated crusade, and this is where this amazing lady comes into her own.



Sarah was a proponent for women in the workplace, but only as teachers and in the medical field, and she advocated women's rights, but she was no feminist. She helped make writing a profitable profession, publishing works by such authors as Edgar Allen Poe, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Washington Irving, and Oliver Wendell Holmes, as well as female authors, and paying her authors well.

In 1840 she sent a female reporter to London to report on the Queen's wedding, and the resulting publicity in *Godey's* is believed to have begun the vogue for the white wedding gown. Very much opposed to slavery, although not an abolitionist, she was strongly devoted to the Union, and that may account for her most persistent campaign and thus her most notable achievement. Sarah Hale's relentless pursuit of one specific goal was to have Thanksgiving celebrated as a National Holiday on the same day every year. When George Washington was President he had set aside Thursday, November 26 to be "a day of public thanksgiving and prayer." Although the Continental Congress had proclaimed a national Thanksgiving back in 1777 and all 13 colonies celebrated it, by 1815 it had basically fallen out of favor, the Southern states mostly ignoring it completely and the others each deciding separately whether or not to even celebrate the holiday, and if so, when.

In Sarah's time the nation was suffering from a growing disconnect, with the issue of slavery becoming more and more divisive, and in her first year as editor of *Godey's*, she suggested that Thanksgiving "might, without inconvenience, be observed on the same day of November, say the last Thursday of the month, throughout all New England, and also in our sister states....It would then have a national character.....a festival which will never become obsolete, for it cherishes the best affectations of the heart—the social and domestic ties. It calls together the dispersed members of the family circle, and brings plenty, joy and gladness to the dwellings of the poor and lowly." Sarah was persistent in the use of her editorials as a platform to espouse her many causes, and in support of Thanksgiving as a national holiday. Sarah insisted that Thanksgiving must be "fixed and perpetuated". In her September 1863 letter to Abraham Lincoln, as she phrased it, she had "placed the papers before the Governors of all the States and Territories—also I have sent these to our Ministers abroad, and our Missionaries to the heathen—and commanders in the Navy."

Her crusade took two decades, along with a great deal of "ink." And that's another point: the first practical typewriter was invented around 1869, so all Sarah's prolific letterwriting was done in her delicate hand. For fifteen years Sarah wrote editorials in *Godey's Lady's Book* every autumn, promoting Thanksgiving as a national holiday on a set date. She wrote impassioned letters to five Presidents in succession: Zachary Taylor, Millard Fillmore, Franklin Pierce, James Buchanan, and lastly Abraham Lincoln, who finally signed the desired proclamation in September 1863.

Sarah went on to publish almost fifty novels and poems during her lifetime, along with numerous nonfiction titles, cookbooks, articles and books on household advice. Amazon's "Legacy Reprint Series" offers reprints of several of her books as being "culturally important". (You can discover some of those amazing titles on line.) She strongly advocated physical education for children and higher education for women, co-founding Vassar College, supporting Emma Willard School in Troy, and founding the Boston Seaman's Aid Society for the benefit of seamen's widows and orphans.

M. Baker, Director and Librarian at the *Pilgrim Society & Pilgrim Hall Museum*, wrote a lengthy article in 2007 referring to Sarah Josepha Hale as "**The Godmother of Thanksgiving.**" With good reason, since it was also Sarah who may be largely responsible for the traditional turkey dinner. In her novel *Northwood*, she not only described in exquisite detail a fine Thanksgiving feast starring roast turkey with stuffing and gravy and pumpkin pie, but in *Godey's Ladies'* Book she included the recipes for the turkey and the pie!

From Downtown Albany - I-787 North to I-90 West to Exit 1 - Route 20/Western Avenue. Continue from ★ below.

<u>From Schenectady</u> - I-890 South to NYS Thruway/I-90 East on NYS Thruway/I-90 to Exit 24. Bear right going through tollbooth. Follow signs, immediately after toll plaza for Route 20/Western Avenue. Continue from ★ below.

From Troy - I-787 South to I-90 West to Exit 1 - Route 20/Western Avenue. Continue from ★ below.

From East - Mass Pike/I-90 West to NYS Thruway/I-87 North to Thruway Exit 24. Bear right going through toll plaza. Follow signs immediately after toll plaza for Route 20/Western Avenue. Continue from ★ below.

R.I.P., Massasoit Ousameequin—again.

Massasoit Ousameequin, the great Indian sachem to whom our Pilgrim forebears owed so much, has finally been laid to rest—again. The year after the Mayflower colonists landed, they signed a treaty with Massasoit, leader of the Wampanoags, ushering in 54 years of peace until his death in 1661. He was buried in what is now Warren, Rhode Island. Unbelievably, in 1891, the construction of a railroad disrupted his eternal rest, condemning his remains and funerary artifacts, and those of 41 other native individuals, to various private collections and seven different museums, and looting, treasure hunting, and archaeological digging are said to have continued in the area after completion of the railroad.

According to Ramona Peters, Coordinator of the Wampanoag Repatriation Confederation, after the 1990 passage of the *Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act*, the Wampanoags realized that the return of the remains and artifacts might be possible, and her group devoted more than two decades to their recovery and collection. It was just this past May 13, 2017, that "658 objects from 42 burials" (reported by *Cape Cod Today*), were respectfully returned to the historic Wampanoag burying ground, what is now Burrs Hill Park (the "Royal Burial Ground") in private traditional sacred ceremonies conducted by the three Wampanoag tribes: The Acquinnah, the Mashpee, and the Assonet Band.



One jarring note: the Pokanoket Tribe of Bristol County, acknowledged by proclamations from various town councils in Rhode Island as indigenous peoples and direct descendants of the great Indian sachem—but not being a federally recognized tribe—were deliberately excluded from participation in the solemn reburial proceedings. In fact, some reports suggest that they were not even aware the event had occurred until they read about it afterward in the newspaper. Their initial reaction was a bitter and public protest. The Pokanoket sagamore, Po Wauipi Neimpaug, was quoted in a press release as saying that the Pokanokets were insulted by the omission, that it was a breach of protocol, and that they will do a formal interment ceremony of their own at a later date. As Pilgrim descendants we're glad that he now rests in peace.
