Their First Spring Anno 1621 (Mayflower Departs and Corn Planted)

"They now began to dispatch the ship away which brought them over, which lay till about this time, or the beginning of April...Afterwards they (as many as were able) began to plant their corn, in which service Squanto stood them in great stead, showing them both the manner how to set it, and after, how to dress & tend it. Also, he told them, except they got fish & set with it in these old grounds it would come to nothing. And he showed them that in the middle of April they should store enough [of fish] come up ye brook, by which they began to build, and taught them how to take it, and where to get other provisions necessary for them. All which they found true by trial & experience. Some English seed they sowed, as wheat and pease, but it came not to good, either by the badness of the seed or lateness of the season or both, or some other defect." (Of Plymouth Plantation by William Bradford, p. 85.)

The California website says, "Plans are underway to design and submit a Mayflower float in Pasadena's Rose Parade in January, 2020." (That's one we'll want to see!)


FROM MAINE.....


AND IN NEW YORK...

For years the New York Society has been giving Compact Awards to senior high students who have shown a "proficiency in the history of the United States and an understanding of the US Constitution. The winners receive a \$100 check and a Mayflower Compact certificate inscribed with their name and the name of their school." Two winners are chosen from public schools, one from private schools, and every year more than 125 awards are presented in the State of New York.

Our New York Society hosts the "Cousins Dinner" every year in March. In June it's the "Summer Solstice Cocktail Party" along with the Society of Colonial Wars, and in November it's the Annual Debutante Ball. This elegant affair is the main fundraising event of the year for the New York Society's educational programs.

The Shop offers Mayflower ties in four colors, a Pilgrim teddy bear, a rosette for the lapel, and a pure silk scarf. Of course more gift items are available through the General Society Shop, and it's worth a look.

FROM DELAWARE.... Can you top this?

Their newsletter tells us that a lady named Amy Dill of Camden descends from 15 different individuals who landed at Plymouth in December, 1620: "...from Isaac Allerton and his wife Mary (Norris) Allerton. Amy's lines also come down from the three Tilleys: John Tilley, Joan (Hurst) Tilley, and Elizabeth Tilley, so that makes six passengers, so far. By the way, Amy's middle name is Howland, so that line is honored by Amy's life. William Mullins and his daughter Priscilla, are counted among Amy's antecedents, and so, Amy also claims John Alden with whom Priscilla 'intermarried.' A cornerstone individual William Brewster and his wife Mary (for whom we do not have a maiden name), count among Amy Dill's great, great grandparents. Amy also descends from George Soule, Francis Cooke and his son, John Cooke, and from Richard Warren. That makes 15. ...and, because she descends from more than one child of some of them, she has 19 provable lines of descent."





FROM VERMONT,,,,

At a previous meeting in Randolph, the guest speaker was James Baker, former curator of the Alden House and former director and senior historian of Plimouth Plantation, speaking on "Pilgrim Images Throughout History."



Did you know.....

....that one of the most beautiful U.S. commemorative coins ever issued was the **1920 Pilgrim Tercentennary Half Dollar**? (I didn't.)

As we approach the Four Hundredth Anniversary of the landing of the Mayflower, the GSMD (General Society, Mayflower Descendants) is encouraging us all to get involved in their enthusiastic campaign for the issuance of a new series of coins by the U.S. Mint for 2020. So it occurred to me to wonder about the Three Hundredth Anniversary, and I began "surfing the Web" to learn more.

Designed by Boston sculptor Cyrus E. Dallin and containing 90% silver, the **1920** Half Dollar features on one side a stylized" portrait (because no actual likeness exists) of Governor William Bradford and the Mayflower in full sail on the other. The *Pilgrim Tercentennary Commission*, through the National Shawmut Bank of Boston and other outlets, asked for production of 500,000 coins, but Con-

gress authorized only 300,000.

Coin collectors have eagerly sought to acquire this handsome and significant coin over the past hundred years, and there are now several websites offering them for sale. In 1920 the going price for the brand-new half dollar was \$1.00 or \$1.50, and in 1965 the average market price was \$10.00. By 1975 it had risen to \$38.00, and in 1985 it was \$200. In today's world the prices vary hugely, depending on the coin's condition, and thanks to the Internet you can track them down for quite a bit less than \$100.00 for coins that have been circulated, while the most exquisite, pristine specimens may demand a price of several thousand dollars.

The Internet discloses that the total quantity issued in 1920 was 200,112. Of that number, 152,112 were actually distributed and 48,000 were "returned for melting." In 1921, another 100,053 were minted, but due apparently to a nationwide economic recession that year, only 20,053 were distributed and 80,000 were "returned for melting."



As Descendants we have a great opportunity to help make the new Mayflower coin(s) a reality for 2020 by joining the Mayflower Society's campaign of letter writing to our Congressional Representatives. Although the specific legislation died when Congress adjourned in 2016, new legislation is currently being drafted, and when the new bills are ready, the GSMD website will contain the information you will need in order to participate—sample letters that you can copy or modify—and you can easily find your own two Representatives' names and addresses on the Internet. If you have already written yours, as I did, it will be a simple matter to revise and write again. If not, do consider doing so to urge passage of this significant legislation. Let's get Congress to authorize "our own" commemorative coins for the Big Four Hundredth!

Also in 1920, a handsome set of three beautiful commemorative stamps was issued by the post office in honor of the Pilgrim Tercentennary year, in denominations of one, two, and five cents. The General Society has filed an application for a new set of postage stamps to be issued in **2020**. Several design ideas have been presented, and the post office invites the public to offer their input. Why not send your ideas to **Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, 475** L'Enfant Plaza SW, Room 3300, Washington, DC 20260-3501? They're listening!


