Old Business: Colony Gov. New Business: Colony Gov. Morton proposed changes to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Albany Colony Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of New York. The proposed changes are listed below and shall be voted on by the membership at the May 2022 Annual Meeting:

ARTICLE IX: MEETINGS

SECTION 3: Annual Member Meetings - Proposed wording:

Annual Meetings shall be held the first Saturday in May and November each year at a specific time and location to be agreed upon by a majority vote of the Officers (or in the absence of the Executive Committee, by the Colony Governor). The Colony Governor and/or *Mayflower Chronicles* Editor shall email or mail notice of each such Annual Meeting in the *Mayflower Chronicles* to each Member at least thirty (30) days prior to each meeting date.

Rationale: Allows for email notice of annual meeting.

SECTION 4: Alternative to Annual Meetings - Proposed wording:

Should the Society be unable to hold a regular Annual meeting due to a National emergency the Society may hold an electronic meeting provided the parameters of advance notice and establishing a quorum are met. At such a meeting the Society may receive reports of officers and committees, elect officers, approve a budget, and conduct any other business that may arise.

Rationale: Allows for virtual alternative if necessary.

Program: "The First Thanksgiving or the First Harvest" was presented by Colony Gov. David Morton. Gov. Morton gave a very informative PowerPoint program that focused on Truths vs. Myths associated with the First Thanksgiving.

A Rescue that Really Mattered!

Descendants of the Pilgrims are likely to be somewhat familiar with the story of the rescue of passenger John Howland, who fell overboard from the deck of the Mayflower during its voyage to the New World. Those of you who are his direct descendants--and there are believed to be about two million alive today--have probably shivered more than once to think about your own great good fortune embodied in the young man's survival.

That episode was an extremely close call indeed, and if young John Howland had not been rescued from that stormy ocean, no one would have ever known about the generations of his future descendants who would never have seen the light of day. Let's just consider for a moment the ramifications of that dramatic event.

"In his list of passengers on the Mayflower, William Bradford tells us that John Howland was one of the 'manservants' of John Carver. During a particularly bad storm on the crossing John Howland (characterized by Bradford as 'a lusty young man') went above deck and was swept overboard, but 'it pleased God that he caught hold of the topsail halyards which hung overboard and ran out at length. Yet he held his hold (though he was sundry fathoms under water) till he was hauled up by the same rope to the brim of the water, and then with a boat hook and other means got into the ship again and his life saved. And though he was something ill with it, yet he lived many years after and became a profitable member both in church & commonwealth.'

"After living to tell the tale, Howland went on to have an amazing life. A few years after arriving in North America . . . he married fellow Mayflower passenger Elizabeth Tilley, daughter of John and Joan Tilley. The couple had 10 children who all survived until adulthood . . . Desire, John, Hope, Elizabeth, Lydia, Hannah, Joseph, Jabez, Ruth, and Isaac. He was elected assistant to the Governor in 1633, 1634 and 1635, and in April 1634 was appointed head of Plymouth's trading post in Kennebec."

Known to be descended from John Howland, are Presidents Franklin Delano Roosevelt, George H.W. Bush, George W. Bush, his wife, Barbara, Edith Roosevelt, wife of former President Theodore Roosevelt, Florida Governor Jeb Bush, Alaska Governor Sarah Palin, and U.S. Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr.

Poets Ralph Waldo Emerson and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow are likewise among his notable descendants, as are the founder of the Latter Day Saints (Mormon faith) Joseph Smith, and Brigham Young, the early Mormon leader. No lesser personages than actors Humphrey Bogart, Chevy Chase, William H. Macy, and Alec Baldwin, as well as actress Maude Adams and stage and film actress Lillian Russell, and pediatrician and author Dr. Benjamin Spock have been counted among the descendants of John Howland. Last but certainly not least among his descendants is our own Mayflower Colony Governor David Morton.








If there had been no strong helping hands in close proximity when young John Howland ignored the sea captain's orders during that tempestuous storm at sea back in 1620 and boldly ventured out onto the heaving deck of the Mayflower, how very different our modern world might be--and we would never know.

Your Chronicles Editor's Pilgrim ancestry also includes a narrow escape--of the opposite kind. If Dorothy May Bradford, beloved wife of my ninth great-grandfather, Pilgrim William Bradford, had <u>not</u> gone overboard and drowned while the Mayflower was at anchor in Plymouth Harbor in the fall of 1620, he would not have had any reason, three years later, to invite a very dear long-time friend, the newly widowed Alice Carpenter Southworth, to join him in the New World and become his second wife. One of <u>their</u> three children, William, was my ancestor. Thus someone else would be creating for you this issue of the *Mayflower Chronicles* today! (Incidentally, Albany Colony Elder Art Young is also descended from Alice Carpenter Southworth.)

New Analysis (2022) Reveals Clues about "Sparrow-Hawk," The Oldest Known Shipwreck of English Colonial America

In 1626, just six years after the arrival of the Mayflower, a forty-foot ship sank in rough seas and was wrecked on Cape Cod. The passengers were helped by members of the Nauset tribe who spoke English and were cared for by the Pilgrims from nearby Plymouth for nearly a year before they eventually found passage on other boats to Virginia to farm tobacco.

Today, the most thorough scientific analysis of timbers found over 150 years ago has provided the best evidence yet that they belonged to the ill-fated ship known as the "Sparrow-Hawk." The results of a multi-year international study of the ship's remains were published recently in the "Journal of Archaeological Science: Reports."

The 2007 photo (below) provided by the Pilgrim Hall Museum shows a collection of 109 surviving timbers from the 1626 sinking of the Hawk now at the Pilgrim Hall Museum, in Plymouth, Mass. The unrepairable vessel was buried by shifting sands and lost until 1863, when a storm uncovered the remarkably well-preserved wreckage that was presumed to be the same ship as described by William Bradford in his journal, because of where it was found:

"Ther was a ship, with many passengers in her and sundrie goods, bound for Virginia," Bradford wrote, going on to describe how the vessel had been at sea for six weeks, how the captain had become sick with scurvy, and they had run out of water and beer. As for the passengers, "The cheefe amongst these people was one Mr. Fells and Mr. Sibsie, which had many servants belonging unto them, many of them being Irish," he wrote.

Although the original name of the ship remains unknown, it has been referred to since the 1860s as the Sparrow-Hawk. The wreck has long been studied and scrutinized by generations of maritime experts, but had never before gone through such a detailed analysis. The study was led by Calvin Mires, a maritime archeologist and researcher with the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Falmouth, Massachusetts, Prof. Daly of the Saxo Institute at the University of Copenhagen, Denmark; and Fred Hocker, the director of research at the Vasa Museum in Stockholm, Sweden.

They used "wiggle-match dating," a form of radiocarbon analysis, and dendrochronology, the study of tree ring growth, to narrow down roughly when the Sparrow-Hawk was built., and it indicated that the wood used to make the boat was harvested between 1556 and 1646, according to the study. "We cannot say with 100% certainty that this is the Sparrow-Hawk," said Donna Curtin, Executive director of the Pilgrim Museum in Plymouth. "But we can say with much more confidence than ever before that what we have is compatible with the story in Gov. Bradford's journal." Another clue that the Sparrow-Hawk is from the early 17th century is the oak and elm from which it is constructed, according to the Vasa Museum's Hocker, who specializes in the history of shipbuilding. "That combination of woods is a traditional combination of materials in shipbuilding in England in that era," he said. "Everything I looked at just screamed 17th century to me."

Although they have been exhibited publicly in the past, the Sparrow-Hawk's remains are currently in storage at the Plymouth museum. More scientific study is planned, and Curtin would like to use digital modeling to construct a 3D image of the ship, with the goal of putting it back on public display in 2026, the 400th anniversary of the wreck.
